


Welcome to the Bunny Bulletin

Perhaps you would like to arrange a subscription for a friend or relative with Bunny connections?


The Subscription is currently £8 per annum *plus postage and packing.*

PET PRAISE THANK YOU

On behalf of Women's Aid Integrated Services (WAIS), I'd like to extend a big and heartfelt "thank you" to Christine and all of you who attended the Pets Service at St Mary the Virgin Church on 2 September.



The atmosphere of the Pets Service was wonderfully warm and inclusive and it was lovely to have such a range of pets there and to see just about every generation represented, pets and owners alike! To see everyone there with their pets I think made all of us reflect on the joy, companionship and comfort that pets can bring to our lives.

That's why our Pets Project is so important. Every day, women and children live with violence at home because leaving means leaving their animals behind too. Wherever there is violence in the home, pets can be threatened, injured and even killed to frighten and intimidate partners and children and to keep them from leaving or finding help.

Through our Pets Project, we recruit wonderful people like Christine and her husband, who become temporary foster carers for pets, providing a safe and loving home for the animal until they can be re-united with their family. Knowing that, through the scheme, a much-loved family pet is safe and well makes a crucial difference in enabling some women and children to become safe and well themselves and be able move on to choose their own futures.

We do not receive any formal funding for our Pets Project and rely on the generosity of donations from the public to help keep the project going. We were delighted by the invitation to come and engage with the Bunny community at the Pets Service and were staggered by the generosity of the congregation, who raised £148 on the day. That's a substantial amount which will be used to help to continue to run the service and so make a big difference to the lives of the families we work with. Once again, our thanks go to all those who were there on the day and were so big-hearted in their support of us.
